

Immigrant health service 2010



Background

At 1 January 2010, the number of 'people of concern' under the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees' (UNHCR) mandate was estimated at 43.3 million worldwide. This includes refugees, asylum seekers, internally displaced people and stateless people. In 2009, the UNHCR identified 15.2 million refugees and 27.1 million internally displaced people.

Australia accepts around 13,500 refugees annually under the Humanitarian Program, around 3,500 of this group resettle in Victoria, and approximately half are aged < 19 years. Over 2009-10, people arriving under the Australian Humanitarian Program were from Africa, Middle Eastern and Asian source countries, in roughly equal proportions.

Key achievements in 2010

- 1062 patient contact episodes
- Awarded recurrent funding for Refugee Health Fellow position by Department of Health at increased EFT
- Provision of 21 education sessions, including 14 external sessions across Victoria
- 5 publications (2 peer reviewed, 2 book chapters, 1 other)
- \$130,000 in research funding
- Increased focus on cross-cultural developmental and educational assessment and links with RCH Education Institute
- Continued involvement in State level policy on high dose vitamin D, and work on new Australasian Consensus Statement on Vitamin D in infants, children and adolescents
- Ongoing work with TB service (Refugee fellow placement in TB clinic) and Department of Gastroenterology and Clinical Nutrition (Gastroenterology fellow placement in Immigrant health clinic)
- Increased collaboration with the Royal Melbourne Hospital Refugee and Travel Clinic with commencement of project developing electronic health record across the four specialist refugee clinics in Victoria
- 3 babies born to clinic staff

Service model

The immigrant health service includes a weekly outpatient clinic, inpatient consultations, education for service providers, and involvement in policy development at State and national level. There is an affiliation with, and contribution towards, the Victorian Paediatric Tuberculosis Service and the Western Region Health Centre Vitamin D Clinic.

The outpatient clinical service has transitioned from providing initial post-arrival health screening (although this is still provided if required) to acting as a tertiary consultation service for primary care providers; with an increased focus on cross-cultural educational and developmental assessment over 2010. Medical assessment, dental assessment, immunisation, pathology collection, radiology and pharmacy are provided onsite. We work closely with the Infectious Diseases, and TB clinics as well as the immunisation service, and increasingly with the RCH education Institute, and the Psychology Department.



Clinical services provided in conjunction with other services

180 additional direct patient contacts were made by the Immigrant Health Team during 2010.

Key points - clinic demographics

- Clinic attendance rates have remained stable at 86%
- The number of consultations has reduced, related to change in service model with an increased number of single complex consultations, and a contribution through staffing arrangements due to leave
- 54% of our consultations in 2009 required the help of an interpreter; this is lower than previous years
- In 2010, we saw children from more than 37 countries speaking 25 languages
