Product Safety Australia, Australian Competition & Consumer Commission	VII	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Choose a strong, sturdy playpen that won't tip over when your baby leans on the sides—it helps to choose a heavier model rather than a lighter one. ▪ Check that folding parts have latches that lock securely and cannot be undone by a baby. ▪ Check that the playpen has no sharp fittings or parts that might snag clothing—this can be a strangulation hazard. ▪ As a guide, check that the playpen is more than 500 mm high and the spaces between the side bars are between 50 mm and 95 mm—larger gaps can trap a child's head.
